# BIBLIOGRAPHY GUIDE

A bibliography is a list of sources used to write a research paper. Bibliographies usually include books, magazines, encyclopedias, and websites. Bibliographies are important because they give credit to the appropriate resources.

## Books with 1 author

- Last and first name of the author.
- *Name of the book* (italicized).
- Name of the publisher,
- Year the book was published.

### EXAMPLE:

Jones, Rebecca. *Chuck the Cat*. Smith Press, 2013.

## Books with more than 1 author

- Last names and first name of first author listed,
- and first name and last name of second author.
- If 3 or more authors, use et al. after first author.
- *Name of the book* (italicized).
- Name of the publisher,
- Year the book was published.

### EXAMPLES:

Howell, Carrie, and Danielle Rowland. *The Hill*. River Publishing, 2011.

Martens, Jessica, et al. *Living in Montezuma*. Johnson Printing, 2015.

# Encyclopedia

- Name of the article. (in quotation marks)
- *Name of the encyclopedia* (italicized).
- The edition number.
- Year the encyclopedia was published.

## EXAMPLE:

"Training." *Canine Encyclopedia*. 6<sup>th</sup> ed., 2009.

# Website

- Last and first name of author, editor, or compiler (if available).
- Name of the site (italicized).
- Name of institution or organization affiliated with site,
- Date of resource creation,
- URL or web address.
- Date of access.

## EXAMPLE:

Pollock, Kam. *Raising Girls*. Pollock Pals, 2013, [www.PollockPals.com/girls](http://www.PollockPals.com/girls).  
Accessed 15 October 2015.

# Magazine

- Last and first name of the authors.
- Name of the article (in quotation marks).
- *Name of magazine* (italicized),
- Day Month Year of publication,
- Page numbers of the articles.

## EXAMPLE:

Sherman, Roberto. "Running Indoors." *Goals Magazine*, July 2012, pp. 14-15.
