Pick-up Drop-off Reminders

- Please be patient and courteous toward MMA volunteers, staff, students, and other drivers.

Redwood Field Trip Chaperone Reflection Amber Allen Parent/Chaperone May 9, 2016

As I begin this reflection page, I have to begin be expressing my gratitude for having been chosen to be a chaperone for this trip. It was truly an honor to have been entrusted with the care of these sweet 6th graders at such a transitional point in their lives. It was truly amazing to watch these children take these first independent steps as they begin to cross the bridge into their own personal journey of growth and teen-hood.

This trip was filled with a few firsts for myself, and many firsts for the majority of the students involved in the journey. For most it was a first time being away from family for that length of time and distance. It was a first train ride, first large bus ride, first time to the Redwood Forrest, first time seeing the ocean, and first time flying. I must say that the staff and leads teachers assigned to the task of coordinating a trip of this magnitude paid special attention to each detail that was necessary for the trip to run as smoothly as possible. They paid special attention to the needs of each student as they formulated cabin and combined education groups so that they could maximize the ability for each child to experience all of the aspects of the trip in a positive, independent light. Chaperones were required to attend meetings ahead to discuss expectations, work on team building and problem solve possible needs and concerns of students that we may need to address and offer support for.

I was so impressed with the camp that was selected, The Alliance Conference Group in the Redwood Forrest. The camp itself was clean, well organized, and well equipped to facilitate all of the needs of each group and individual student that may arise. A personal favorite camp time of mine was enjoying well-balanced, delicious, nutrition meals with food a plenty! What truly impressed me the most about the camp itself aside from the breathtaking views, was the curriculum and well trained encouraging and engaging naturalist staff members. I watch each of the naturalists work on team building with the kids, working to identify them as individuals and learn their personalities, all the while leading the kids in an opportunity to learn more about the others in group they were in and how they could work to help strengthen each other. They gave very engaging lessons and made the outdoors their classroom. I could see the kids listening and eager to participate in the lessons that were being taught and loving the opportunity after the lessons to explore and apply the information they had been taught in a hands on application. What better way to teach and learn for a student than to hear it, see it, touch it, smell it, and yes in some cases even taste it!

The Challenge Courses were challenging in different ways to different people. It was such a great opportunity to see how each person handled themselves under the pressure of doing hard things. I loved how the naturalists taught about each of the different challenges and the safety that was taken into consideration and needed to be respected. They also taught about the different levels of comfort zone, goal setting and how to use encourage words to strengthen each other. Some of the courses were more physically challenging and others were more mentally challenging. Some children rose to the challenge and pushed themselves to do things that were hard for them and learned that they could do hard things, others committed to at least try and that was worthy of positive support and admiration for pushing themselves out of their comfort zone. At the end of the day we were all winners. We learned more about ourselves, and how to support others through challenges. I also saw the kids recognize the importance of kind words and not minimizing the challenge someone is facing just because it may come more natural to one person than another. Watching the kindness expressed and bonding occurring as they learned to strengthen one another with kindness was so heartwarming. What a fantastic life skill to learn and get to practice!

The trip to the ocean was fantastic. The kids were a little disappointed that for safety reasons they were not going to be able to take their shoes off, swim, or bring home beach souvenirs. I can understand that disappointment, although I for one have to side with the caution of safety first also. As we got to the beach and the kids were able to go to the tide pools, all I saw were faces full of excitement and discovery. I'm pretty sure that any disappointment they may have originally had, had dissolved as they were moving from tide pool to tide pool collecting treasures of ocean discovery. They were so excited to see the grandeur of the ocean, find and touch sea animals most of them had only seen in pictures and experience what they feel like, where and how they live. What a fantastic opportunity!

The end of the trip was once again filled with many mixed emotions! Most of the kids were so sad to realize that the trip was quickly coming to an end. They were sad that they were out of time, and eager at the same time to get home to family and their own beds and pets. I think that they all felt a little older, a little wiser, a little stronger, and a little more ready for the new changes that are not far off for them. I believe that this trip has provided them such a great opportunity for growth at such a pivotal time, as they are quickly approaching the end of elementary years and will be moving on to their teen and junior high years which will be filled with new faces, and more challenging expectations educationally, mentally, emotionally and physically. I believe each of them has discovered that they can do hard things; they can face a challenge and come out a better, stronger person as they stretch themselves out of their comfort zone and conquer their fears. What a wonderful program of education and self discover for these kids to have been a part of! What a fantastic opportunity for myself to be in a position to have been able to help facilitate that opportunity. I'm also grateful for the personal growth and experience I got to take home myself from this trip. I am truly grateful!
