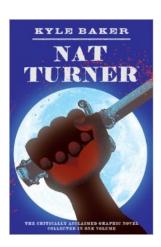

Essential Question:

What power do individuals have to challenge the constraints in which they live?



Overview

This week we will examine several ways that slaves dealt with their role in life. You will choose a poem by African-American abolitionist, Frances E.W. Harper, to read an analyze and you'll read the graphic novel, <u>Nat Turner</u>, by Kyle Baker. As you read the novel, you will have to provide the narration in your journal since

the only words included in the book are Nat Turner's confession he made after he led a slave rebellion in August of 1831 in Virginia. The book is divided into four parts, so you can write a summary for each section in your journal. We will have time to discuss your interpretations of the images and read how others reported on what happened by reading primary sources from that time period in history.

In addition to your studies of slavery, we will also have time to listen to current event presentations and you will be able to continue reading your historical book of your choosing by summarizing the parts you read this week.

Essential Questions: Why didn't more slaves escape north? How did some manage to escape despite the odds?

Overview: In addition to the current events, poetry analysis, and novel summarization, you will continue to study primary documents in the pilot program: Zoom In! Last week we learned about the slave laws that Kentucky put into place to deter slaves from running away. This week you will explore an oral history of a former slave and an autobiography of a conductor on the Underground Railroad. Analyzing these documents and taking notes on them will help you to write your 4-paragraph essay next week answering the essential questions of this mini-unit.
