

- Bazaar street signs
  - o Identify the info necessary for the public to know about the event.

- Circle & number the order of dominance.
- Create 3 different thumbnail sketches of layout.
- Create 1 actual sign with acrylic paints.
- Ceramic necklace or bracelet
  - Create 3 thumbnails of a beaded necklace or bracelet.
  - o The design must include dominant with subordinate features.
  - Make the ceramic beads
    - Paint if desired.
  - String the beads.
- 2d design project of your choice.
  - Create 3 thumbnails.
  - Use any material to use the Fibonacci Sequence (Golden Spiral) as your hierarchy layout.

## Terms:

<u>Hierarchy:</u> the arrangement of features in a way that implies importance; how the viewers' eyes move through the work of art

<u>Focal Point:</u> the most important visual areas (receiving the most attention)

Dominant: power and superiority, having great visual emphasis

<u>Subordinate:</u> minor, lesser, lower in rank, receding into the background <u>Emphasis:</u> method of creating dominance, focal points, and hierarchy <u>White Space:</u> blank space intentionally left to improve visual emphasis
