Course Description:

United States History is designed to give students a thorough understanding of United States History, requiring students to master historical and analytic skills, including chronological and spatial thinking, historical research, and historical interpretation. The class strives to prepare students to assess historical materials, evaluate relevance and reliability, and deal critically with problems and materials in United States History.

Students will understand:

The role of geography in shaping United States History

The relationship between events of different time periods

The changes caused by European exploration in the Americas

European colonization and settlement of North America

The significance of the American Revolution in the development of the United States

The structure and function of the United States government established by the Constitution

The territorial growth of the United States and expansion of the political system and social rights before the Civil War

The significance of the Civil War Era to the United States

The development of the American West following the Civil War

Our class topics will fit in within the cycle theme:

Orientation: August 15th- September 23rd

Community: September 26th- November 11th

Structure: November 28th- January 20th

Patterns: January 30th- March 17th

Balance: March 27th- May 12th

Course Expectations:

Students will need to be prepared to work each class period (having writing utensils available, follow directions, and bring their notebooks and planners each day. Students will also be

expected to use speaking, reading, listening, and writing skills in this class. It is the responsibility of the student to talk with the instructor if they cannot turn in assignments and projects prior to expected due dates.

Textbooks and Materials:

Students will use the Atlas of United States History along with National Geographic and Smithsonian magazines in the classroom. Other useful resources and/or web links will be provided on the U.S. History blog page listed above.

Course Policies:

Student Work:

Students will use communication, creative thinking, problem solving, critical thinking, research and presentations, social participation and cooperation. Plagiarism is not allowed at all in the classroom. If plagiarism is used in written/oral assignment or exam, that student will receive a failing grade on that assignment and possibly the entire course.

Portfolio:

Work from journals, handouts, assignments/projects, reports, or tests can all be used in student portfolios.

Group Activities:

Students are expected to participate in group activities. Using problem solving, communication and cooperation skills, students will work together to present a final product.

Homework Expectations:

Homework is applicable if a student did not finish his/her work in the classroom. There will be occasional reading, research, worksheets, and study material that students are expected to complete and turn in the next day.

Grading Guidelines:

- 1. Entries in the grade book that count towards the final grade will be limited to course or grade level standards.
- 2. Extra credit will not be given at any time.
- 3. Students will be allowed multiple opportunities to demonstrate their understanding of content standards in various ways. Retakes and revisions will be allowed. However, a student must prove he/she has mastered the content prior to the retake. This retake will need to be scheduled at a time that is convenient for the teacher.
- 4. Teachers will determine grade book entries by considering multiple points of data emphasizing the most recent data and provide evidence to support their determination. Students will be provided multiple opportunities to practice standards independently through homework or other class work. Practice assignments and activities will be consistent with classroom standards for the purpose of providing feedback. Practice assignments, including homework, will not be included as part of the final grade.

Absences:
